#### **Bias**

Blindspot: Hidden Biases of Good People by Mahzarin R. Banaji, Anthony G. Greenwald; explores the unconscious biases that influence our actions and decisions, providing insights into how we can recognize and mitigate these biases for a fairer society.

#### **Race and Colonialism**

 Why I'm no longer talking to white people about race by Reni Eddo-Lodge explores the complexities of systemic racism in the UK, addressing issues such as white privilege, black history, and the everyday experiences of racism that often go

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unacknowledged.

 Africa Is Not a Country, Breaking Stereotypes of Modern Africa by Dipo Faloyin; challenges prevailing stereotypes by presenting a nuanced and diverse portrayal of contemporary Africa, highlighting its rich cultures, histories, and innovations.

## **Intersectionality**

- Reach Everyone on the Planet by Gunda-Werner-Institute; honors Kimberlé
  Crenshaw and highlights the importance of intersectionality in understanding and
  addressing interconnected systems of discrimination, such as racism, capitalism, and
  patriarchy, through various contributions from feminist thinkers and activists. Available

- The culture map (intl ed): Decoding How People Think, Lead, and Get Things Done Across Cultures by Erin Meyer; offers a framework for understanding and navigating cultural differences in business and communication, providing practical strategies for effective cross-cultural collaboration and leadership.
- Women, Race & Class by Angela Y. Davis; examines the intersections of gender, race, and class, providing a historical analysis of the women's liberation movement and its ties to issues of racial and economic justice.

## LGBTQ+

- Boys Don't Cry by Jack Urwin; explores the cultural expectations and pressures
  placed on men, particularly around masculinity and emotional expression, and how
  these norms contribute to mental health issues and societal problem
- As Nature Made Him by John Colapinto; tells the true story of David Reimer, a boy
  raised as a girl after a botched circumcision, exploring the complexities of gender
  identity and the profound effects of medical and psychological interventions on an
  individual's life.
- Fun Home: A Family Tragicomic by Alison Bechdel (Comic book). Distant and exacting, Bruce Bechdel was an English teacher and director of the town funeral home, which Alison and her family referred to as the Fun Home. It was not until college that Alison, who had recently come out as a lesbian, discovered that her father was also gay. A few weeks after this revelation, he was dead, leaving a legacy of mystery for his daughter to resolve.
- **US** by Sara Soler *(comic book)*: What happens when the life you thought you had does a 180° turn? Everything, and yet...nothing.

### **Maternity, Inequality**

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 Amalia (comic book) by Aude Picard, Amalia is overwhelmed by the chaos in her family. At work, she is unable to keep up with the demands for agility and flexibility.

Despite her efforts, Amalia eventually reaches a breaking point and cracks under the

pressure.

Feminism, Gender violence

• Feminism Is for Everybody; Passionate Politics by bell hooks; is a comprehensive

guide that explains the core principles of feminism, advocating for its accessibility to all. hooks addresses various issues such as reproductive rights, gender equality, and

the intersections of race and class, emphasizing that feminism is a movement for

everyone, not just women.

• Hood Feminism: Notes from the Women That a Movement Forgot by Mikki

Kendall; critiques mainstream feminism for overlooking the issues faced by marginalized women, addressing topics like food insecurity, gun violence, and

housing, and advocating for a more inclusive feminist movement that prioritizes the

needs of all women.

• Becoming, Unbecoming (Comic Book) by Una, uses images and text to delve into

Una's experiences and the broader implications of growing up in a culture that

overlooks male violence.

• Los capullos no regalan flores (comic book, only in Spanish) by Moderna de

Pueblo; We grow up with an internalized machismo learned from what we see in our

mothers and grandmothers, we perpetuate this until adulthood, when life and various

situations begin to open our eyes.

• Soy Mar (Comic book, only in Spanish) by Cristina Portolano; is a fantastic story that

explores the realm of emotions, the discovery of one's own vulnerability, and the fear

and attraction towards others.

SORS/WomenInBSC: Cooling in a Warming World: The Role of Near Term

**Climate Forcers**

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In a warming climate due to greenhouse gases, it is important to study other climate drivers, such as Near Term Climate Forcers (NTCFs), which include aerosols and tropospheric ozone with lifetimes shorter than two decades. Through multi-model analysis, we explore how higher NTCF concentrations impact climate from 1950-2014 and 2015-2054. Using CMIP6 simulations, our results show three main impacts: general cooling, especially in the Arctic; increased convection in the subpolar gyre, particularly in the Labrador Sea; and a southward shift of the Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ). Stronger future air quality policies targeting NTCFs would mitigate these climatic effects, though less than recent changes.
